Letter from the Director

Dear friends.

What an outstanding year 2024 has been for Greyhound Friends. We have taken in homeless dogs from Ireland, Spain, Portugal, Australia, as well as domestic greyhounds and sighthounds. Just this past week we welcomed four new Irish greyhounds, and a transport from China is planned for January. Adoption interest has remained strong, and more dogs have found great homes than we had expected, since facility upgrades over the summer paused adoption operations for over a month.

Thanks to your kind financial support, Greyhound Friends has been very successful in placing sighthounds throughout New England. This year we were called on by some local animal control officers who had sighthounds in need, and we were happy to help. Our focus on sighthound breeds

helps to maintain and grow a well matched adopter pool, which in turn prevents dogs from lingering too long in the kennel. Our dogs typically get adopted within a few weeks, and faster turnover allows us to help more dogs in need.

We could not operate without the amazing efforts of the small staff and many volunteers who work tirelessly every day for the dogs. When you visit, you will notice that everyone here has a relationship with each dog and will eagerly share all they know. We provide adopters with guidance and breed education in a comfortable environment when they come to meet and interact with the dogs, which helps assure the best fit for their lifestyle and the dogs' individual needs. Our rate of return is very low, which can be attributed to the time we spend to evaluate potential adopters and recommend the right match.

The "happy tails" success stories shared on our Facebook and Instagram pages are incredibly rewarding to see. This success would not be possible without you!

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Good Things in a Smaller Package

You may have wondered why we stay relatively small, compared to other local adoption groups. There are several

factors that make a smaller model better for our dogs. Our kennel is currently

equipped to house up to 15

dogs at a time. All the dogs

we receive from outside

Massachusetts must go

through a state-required isolation process, and our facility can only isolate a few dogs at a time. While this is limiting, we have found that fewer dogs can receive more individualized care and a shorter stay before adoption.

Our kennels are immaculate,

and the dogs get more attention than many do at home! We truly know our dogs, and that allows us to make better matches. Come visit the shelter: we think you will see the difference for yourself.

A Scout Steps Up in Service

Asked why he chose this particular project, Ragav said "I love dogs and feel a strong connection to them, so I wanted to provide something that could help them. Now we can teach them how to go up and down stairs, which

some dogs are a little afraid of. Training can improve their chances to be adopted."

Greyhound Friends executive director Terri Shepard explained, "Not only are the kennel dogs learning some new skills, they're also gaining confidence and benefiting from a fun new activity in their day. This is such a big help to us."

Longtime shelter volunteer and past president Cathy DeNorscia oversaw the planning and construction. "I'm so thankful that the

Hard Work Pays Off with "Happy Tails"

The need for sighthound adoption is pressing, and the work can seem never-ending. Even so, nothing lifts our spirits and fuels our resolve more than seeing our adopted dogs happy, healthy, and often plain silly in their loving homes. When adopters send "pupdates" we eagerly post them on our social media pages so supporters can share in the joy. Here are just three from this year.

Momo had been adopted

from a group that no longer exists. When his owner had a major change in life circumstances and could no longer care for him, he was surrendered to us in February, at age 8. Staff noticed that he was lethargic, even for an older grey, and vet work revealed an advanced stage of Lyme disease.

We began treatment right away, but Momo suffered some setbacks in his recovery. The Lyme had begun to cause

kidney damage, and rounds of additional medication were required before he finally turned a corner. Donations to the Medical Needs Fund made his recovery possible.

Momo is doing well now in his permanent home. He visits the kennel often and shows off his happy zoomies in the big fenced field.

Indy is a survivor of the infamous Chinese meat trade. Rescued by our amazing partners there, he waited more than 2 years in kennels, through the pandemic's transport moratorium, until being permitted to travel to the US. It was noted in China that he had some issues with his

eyesight, and vet checks revealed some significant impairment. It was not obvious, though, in the way he navigated our shelter and runs and interacted with both people and other dogs.

Indy was adopted into a

home with a greyhound and two feline residents, and he fit right in seamlessly. We love seeing his Instagram updates, lounging in all the sunny spots and modeling an array of handsome new collars. His vision is very limited, but he continues to manage very well in his familiar environment.

A big surprise came when Indy's adopters shared his canine DNA results. The test revealed a mix of 15 breeds, including not only greyhound and chart Polski (a Polish greyhound cousin) but also German shepherd, some rare Asian breeds, and 6% wolf! He truly is a very special dog.

Reese is an American ex-racing greyhound, one of several we were pleased to bring in this year. Jeb is a personable, playful young dog who seemed to genuinely appreciate the comforts he enjoyed during his stay at the shelter.

Unlike the thoroughly vetted dogs coming

from overseas, domestic greyhounds arrive in need of spay/neuter surgeries and other basic veterinary care. Reese went home soon after his procedures. His adopter sent photos and wrote, "He is doing so great! Very much a mellow love bug." Reese's happiness shows in his big toothy grin, and it brings us joy to see him loving his life!
